PROTECTING THE PAST PROMOTING THE PRESENT PLANNING FOR POSTERITY

The Tamworth Civic Society was originally founded in 1973. After a period of dormancy, it was – under a Steering Committee led by former Civic Society committee member, David Biggs – successfully relaunched in September 2015 at a packed public meeting. We are now **The Tamworth and District Civic Society** to emphasise that the society is also concerned, as it always has been, with the villages in the district around the town in both Staffordshire and Warwickshire.

The Civic Society cares about the area's past, present, and future, and aims to be a community forum for improvement. With a strong, shared voice, members believe that they can make a positive difference. TDCS wants the best for Tamworth and District, with lessons learned from the past, positive changes in the present, and a sustainable, well-planned future for local residents. It places strong emphasis on **protecting and promoting the area's heritage and natural environment**, and in encouraging **civic pride and community engagement**.

The Civic Society wishes to protect existing historic architecture and townscape, but it also seeks and supports appropriate new developments that complement and enhance the local built heritage and the area's rich history. It wishes to maintain and protect the natural environment of parks, fields, woodland and other green spaces which support flora and fauna, and provide the "green lungs" for local people.

Overall, TDCS campaigns for an attractive town and district, with a sustainable infrastructure and a thriving, cohesive community that takes justifiable civic pride in its heritage and identity.

»ONE HUNDRED STRONG«

We provide a **strong community voice for people who genuinely care about Tamworth and the villages**, and we have a broad range of activities that enable them to contribute to the improvement of our built and natural environment, and the promotion of our heritage.

These are very exciting and busy times for the reinvigorated Civic Society. There hasn't been such a need for a strong and active watchdog since we were originally founded in 1973. There are so many concerns and issues around the direction in which Tamworth is currently being planned and developed, and every single citizen should be interested in, and doing something about, the decisions being taken around us, because they affect us now, and all future generations.

Sam told us: ***"I am glad to be part of a group where members have good ideas and initiatives to improve our environment and promote our area, and who are enthusiastic and positive about what can be achieved. The new Civic Society is something that young people should be getting involved in, as we shall likely be living in Tamworth for many years to come, and our future is affected by the decisions taken today. I'm looking forward to being able to contribute."***

The Society needs to continue to grow. Our members are from all age groups and every shade of political opinion. We are a non-party-political organisation, united in our shared passion for Tamworth. We aim for mutual support with similar organisations, and have links with and share members with many other groups which have more specifically focussed interests, including the Heritage Trust, History Group, Polesworth Society, LitFest, Friends of Hopwas Wood, Friends of Tamworth Castle, The Peel Society, Middleton Hall Trust, Tamworth Guild of Town Guides, and more. We ask all members to get involved as much as possible in the activities and work of the Society, and to encourage others to join us, so that we will continue to be, in the words of the Civic Voice, a fiercely independent grassroots organisation, provocative, stubborn, forceful, inspiring, and outspoken.

PLANNING MATTERS

The Society's aims are:

- to preserve, promote, and celebrate our heritage and history
- to protect and improve the environment
- to advance civic pride and engagement

An important part of our work is therefore to advise on the appropriateness of proposed developments, to encourage **high standards and excellence in town planning, architectural design and quality**, and to provide a forum on planning, environmental, and heritage issues of concern within the community.

To advance these objectives we are engaging with and establishing **close and constructive relationships with our Councils and planners**. We are holding regular meetings with planners at Tamworth Borough Council, Lichfield District Council, and North Warwickshire Borough Council, so that we are kept closely informed of development proposals, and they can benefit from our input. We are represented on the Tamworth **Conservation Area Advisory Committee**, which monitors our seven local conservation areas.

The Society will bring the expertise and experience of our members to make representations to the planners, and will be regarded as a trusted intermediary between local government and local people, a respected and influential voice of the community.

The Society is compiling an At-Risk Register of endangered sites to be carefully monitored, such as the Moat House, the old Tamworth Grammar School, the Victorian Wilnecote Board Schools. There is much important work to be done in this field. If you have any knowledge of, or suggestions about, buildings at risk of neglect or demolition, or if you are interested in joining a Planning Group to monitor and investigate planning issues, please contact the committee. We would welcome the help.

»PLANNING FOR POSTERITY«

The need for an active and effective Civic Society is highlighted by the unfortunate planning decisions which were already 'faits accomplis' before our launch, such as the plan to build 1100 houses on Amington Golf Course, where 40 years ago the Civic Society planted 1000 trees, the Coton Lane green field development which will add massive congestion, overload amenities, and increase urban sprawl, and the new Local Plan itself.

We have grappled with several important planning issues since our inception only six months ago. To mention just a few.....

SOCIETY FIGHTS AGAINST PLANS TO BUILD ON WIGGINTON PARK

Towards the end of 2015, the Society was alarmed to discover that Tamworth Borough Council had submitted a planning application to build on a piece of land which it owned on Wigginton Park. Although disguised under the location of 'Solway Close', their proposal was in fact to build up to 25 houses on the site of the former orangery and outbuildings, butting directly on to Wigginton Lodge itself.

On behalf of the Society, David Biggs submitted a formal objection, highlighting the ancient historical significance of the site, which dates back to Mediaeval times, and querying why the Council had failed to consult with the Georgian Group, as required by law for applications affecting listed Georgian buildings.

The meeting of the Planning Committee on 5th January was addressed by Richard Kingstone as the Ward Councillor, and by Derek Hoey, representing the Society. Both spoke passionately against the proposal, pointing out that, back in the 1960's, Tamworth Council had purchased Wigginton Park for it to be set aside as a 'green lung' for residents of the town and arguing that it should remain untouched. However, after some interesting and lively debate, the committee passed the proposal by 8 votes to 5, although it was agreed to slightly reduce the number of units to be built.

So, despite our best efforts, Tamworth Borough Council has intruded into an historic and treasured area of the town, much to the agony of all those who value our heritage and environment – but be assured that Tamworth & District Civic Society will continue to fight on behalf of local residents and make our local authorities aware of their responsibilities and of the feelings of their citizens.

WILNECOTE VICTORIAN BOARD SCHOOLS UNDER THREAT

The Society has been closely involved from our launch with the problem of Staffordshire County Council's intentions towards the 1877 school buildings, which we consider to be of architectural merit, as well as being an asset of community value.

We attended a meeting of interested parties at which it seemed clear that a decision had been made, without proper consultation, to evict the community groups that used the buildings, demolish, and replace with a very insensitively and unimaginatively designed private old people's home, with no regard for local heritage or community needs. TDCS was integral to the hugely well-supported public meeting that followed. We gained the support of the Victorian Society, and have lobbied the Councils. We remain concerned and are doing everything possible to thwart the threat.



»PROMOTING THE PRESENT«

TDCS is informed of all local planning applications and will carefully consider and offer constructive comments and reasoned objections, both in writing and in oral representations at committee, wherever appropriate. Other matters of interest at the moment are the County Council's plans for phase 2 of the "Gateway" project in **Victoria Road**; the demolition of **Whittington Heath Golf Club** whose previous incarnations were as racecourse grandstand, and old soldiers' home (pictured→) to build embankments for HS2; proposed development adjacent to **Lady Meadow** and the Castle; the obliteration of the countryside on the north side of Tamworth by blanket development; the insidious blight of garden-grabbers. Let us know what concerns you.




EVENTS REVIEW – The First Six Months







WHAT'S GREAT AND WHAT GRATES ABOUT TAMWORTH?


In working towards its aims of promoting, preserving and celebrating the history of the area, The Tamworth & District Civic Society always seeks the views of local citizens. So all of those who attended the Society's launch meeting in September 2015, were invited to submit their comments and ideas on post-it notes and answer some simple but crucial questions – **'What is great about Tamworth?'**



'What needs to be better in Tamworth?'



and 'What would you like to see change in Tamworth?'



The answers gave us some interesting reading – and, of course, several of them form the basis of some of the key issues which we seek to address.

The highlights of 'What is great about Tamworth?' were seen as breadth of the town's facilities, along with its landscaping and environment, closely followed by its heritage and historic buildings. **Rivers, pigs, flower beds, and pubs** were mentioned.

However, things that could be improved included how we manage planning and development of the town, the protection of our heritage and the demise of shopping facilities in the town centre. **Middle Entry, the flats, smells, potholes, roads, and traffic lights** were singled out.

The answers to what people would like to see change in Tamworth were many and varied, but interestingly, one issue that was raised above all others was the retention and protection of Wilnecote Board School – a cause which is still being fought by the Society (in the face of a very awkward position being adopted by Staffordshire County Council).

Chairman David Biggs commented 'We see ongoing engagement with our members – and indeed all local people – as our lifeblood. We need to understand what interests them as well as what concerns them and make sure that we take that into account when planning our activities and making this a vibrant and effective Society'


